OU Alert (www.getrave.com/login/oglethorpe)

Members of the Oglethorpe community will receive timely warnings of emergencies via the OU Alert/RAVE emergency notification system. Critical university notifications on safety issues, class cancellation, and weather alerts are provided via cell phone, e-mail, campus phone line, Twitter and Facebook. Members of the community can register preferences via the site using their university log-on username and password: https://www.getrave.com/login/oglethorpe. The notification system is tested at least once annually, and advance notice is provided to community via e-mail, the university's official mode of communication.

Annual Disclosure of Crime Statistics

Oglethorpe University complies with the Higher Education Act of 1965 section 485(f) known as the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (Clery Act) which provides the Secretary of Education with campus crime statistics since 1990 with fire statistics since 2008. These statistics include crimes on or near the campus (unobstructed public areas adjacent to campus). Additionally with the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013 (VAWA), in compliance with the amendments to the Clery Act, Oglethorpe University continues to prohibit the crimes of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking and provides statistics for these crimes and policies, procedures and programs in the annual security report.

Via this report, Oglethorpe University increased transparency about campus incidents, community member rights, policies and procedures for conduct proceedings support services, and prevention and awareness/educational requirements and programming.

Statistics are collected from a broad range of campus officials including campus safety, local law enforcement, residence life staff and the dean of students in the campus life office. The Annual Security Report is for all current students and employees, prospective students and employees and is available upon request on paper but is maintained on the university's website.

In addition to the Annual Security Report, Oglethorpe University maintains a log of crime on campus for the past 90 days documenting the nature, date, time and general location of each crime and disposition

if known on the campus safety web page. This log can be provided in writing upon request 48 hours in advance.

Victims or witnesses of crimes may submit information for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics via the incident report link (link) or directly to the Director of Campus Safety or Dean of Students. These disclosures are voluntary and confidential. Support for these persons are available 24/7 by contacting Campus Safety 404-504-1998 or the professional staff member on-call 404-919-6875. Confidential support is available via the university counseling center by calling 404-364-8456 or in person in Goodman Hall.

List of Definitions:

In addition to the definitions below, Oglethorpe University has defined terms related to sexual misconduct and violence. Please <u>view section 11.3 of the University Bulletin</u> and <u>sexual misconduct</u> resources webpage.

Aggravated Assault: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

- Arrest: Persons processed by arrest, citation, or summons.
- Arson: Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.
- Burglary: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft.
- Dating Violence: Violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a
 romantic or intimate nature with the victim. The existence of such a relationship shall be
 determined based on the reporting party's statement and with consideration of the length of
 the relationship, the type of relationship, and the frequency of interaction between the persons
 involved in the relationship. For the purposes of this definition:
 - Dating violence includes, but is not limited to, sexual or physical abuse or the threat of such abuse.
 - o Dating violence does not include acts covered under the definition of domestic violence.
- Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property: to willfully or maliciously destroy, damage, deface, or otherwise injure real or personal property without the consent of the owner or the person having custody or control of it.
- Domestic Violence: A felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed:
 - o By a current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim;
 - By a person with whom the victim shares a child in common;
 - By a person who is cohabitating with, or has cohabitated with, the victim as a spouse or intimate partner;
 - By a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred, or by any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred.
- Fondling: The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable

- of giving consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.
- Hate Crime: A criminal offense that manifests evidence that the victim was intentionally selected because of the perpetrator's bias against the victim. For the purposes of Clery, the categories of bias include the victim's actual or perceived race, religion, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, ethnicity, national origin, and disability.
- *Incest:* Sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.
- Intimidation: To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.
- Larceny-Theft: The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Constructive possession is the condition in which a person does not have physical custody or possession, but is in a position to exercise dominion or control over a thing.
- Liquor Law Violations: The violation of state or local laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, or use of alcoholic beverages, not including driving under the influence and drunkenness. Include in this classification: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing, etc., of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating still; furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; underage possession; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on train or public conveyance; and attempts to commit any of the above.
- Motor Vehicle Theft: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.
- Murder/Non-Negligent Manslaughter: The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.
- Negligent Manslaughter: The killing of another person through gross negligence.
- *Rape:* The penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus, with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim.
- Sex Offenses (Forcible): Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent. A. Forcible Rape The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity (or because of his/her youth). B. Forcible Sodomy Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity. C. Sexual Assault With An Object The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity. D. Forcible Fondling The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or, not forcibly or against the person's will where the

- victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.
- Sex Offenses (Non-Forcible): Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse. A. Incest Non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law. B. Statutory Rape Non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.
- Simple Assault: An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration, or loss of consciousness.
- *Stalking:* Engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to:
 - o Fear for the person's safety or the safety of others; or
 - o Suffer substantial emotional distress.
- Statutory Rape: Sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.
- Unfounded Crime: A reported crime that upon investigation by law enforcement authorities is found to be false or baseless. Only sworn or commissioned law enforcement personnel may unfound a crime. Crime reports can be properly determined to be false only if the evidence from a complete and thorough investigation establishes that the crime reported was not, in fact, completed or attempted in any manner.
- Weapons: The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, concealment, or use of firearms, cutting instruments, explosives, incendiary devices or other deadly weapons. This classification encompasses weapons offenses that are regulatory in nature. Include in this classification: manufacture, sale or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; using, manufacturing, etc, of silencers; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; and attempts to commit any of the above.

Oglethorpe University Awareness and Bystander Intervention Programming

Oglethorpe University is committed to making our community as safe as possible. In order to empower our students, we have developed the following programs and committees:

- Haven Online Pre-Orientation & Faculty/Staff Programming: The Haven Understanding Sexual Assault program is an online training required of all new students before they enter campus. Haven uses a population-level approach to educate all students on the issues associated with sexual assault and relationship violence, taking into account their unique perspectives and experiences, by providing key definitions and statistics, reflective and personalized content, bystander skill and confidence-building strategies, and Oglethorpe-specific policies, procedures, and resources. Faculty and staff are also required to complete an employee specific version of Haven as new hires and again as content is further developed.
- **Green Dot Bystander Intervention**: This bystander intervention program is designed to provide students with tactics and techniques to keep each other safe on campus. Developed by educators at The University of Kentucky, Green Dot has proven to reduce the rate of violence on campuses across the country. Green Dot will launches each year in the fall semester. Staff and

- student leaders have been Green Dot trained since 2013. For more information, please visit the Green Dot website by clicking this link.
- Divas in Defense (Self Defense Program): This student lead program partners with Campus Safety and local self-defense experts to provide self-defense training to Oglethorpe students. Though this program is marketed to women, all students are welcome to attend. Sessions are held at least once a semester.
- Alcohol & Other Drug (AOD) Taskforce: The Counseling Center, Campus Life staff members, and student representatives work together to develop relevant alcohol and drug abuse, healthy relationships and sexual misconduct, and wellness programming. They use current data from institutional surveys to identify most effective programming and intervention.

Oglethorpe Campus Safety Department

Campus safety services are provided by G4S Secure Solutions. Oglethorpe campus safety is responsible for monitoring and patrolling campus and responding to campus needs. They do not have arrest authority and rely on the relationship with local law enforcement, the Brookhaven Police Department for intervention and assistance in criminal matters.

Campus safety personnel provide prompt and accurate reporting of campus incidents and crimes.

With other departments in the campus life division, the director of campus safety develops programming and messages that inform students and employees about campus security procedures and practices. These efforts encourage students and employees to be responsible for their own security and security of others. Programs about prevention of crimes and personal security are promoted in residence halls and in faculty and staff meetings.

Polices Regarding Security of Access to Campus Facilities

Campus residence halls are secured 24/7, and keys and access cards are granted to current residents in good standing only. Other campus facilities are locked and unlocked by campus safety personnel.

Student behavior off-campus in university sanctioned events or activities are subject to the student code of conduct. Per the <u>University Bulletin</u>, <u>2.7.4.4</u> all students have an ongoing requirement to report any disciplinary and criminal matters while enrolled at the University.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Oglethorpe Campus Safety together with the departments of Facilities and Information Technology maintain all safety and security systems on campus including locks, doors, window screens, lights, fire safety, and life safety measures. The departments of Campus Life, Residence Life, and Athletics also assist. Campus Safety conducts regular inspections of locks and other safety equipment.

Any facilities concerns should be reported to campus safety 404-504-1188. Routine work orders can be entered by any member of the community by completing a work order form. Issues with student card key access should reported immediately to the help desk, helpdesk@oglethorpe.edu on the main floor of the library.

Fire and safety systems are maintained and reviewed on a quarterly basis via collaboration between Campus Safety and Facilities. Fire drills are conducted via Residence Life and Campus Safety on an annual basis. Campus-wide emergency response is reviewed by committee twice annually, and employees and students receive information via trainings, on-line resources, and posted signs.

Oglethorpe University Polices on Alcohol and Drugs

Oglethorpe University works to provide students and employees with prompt and fair attention to these matters, and most cases are resolved within 60 days. At Oglethorpe, when you report being a victim (complainant) of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking, you will be provided a written explanation of your rights and options in addition of written notification of counseling, health, mental health, victim advocacy, legal assistance, visa/immigration assistance, financial aid and other services available for the victims at the university or in the community. Oglethorpe University supports the complainant's right to report any complaint of sexual misconduct or sexual violence to law authorities. For more information about reporting and resources, please refer to the sexual misconduct policy and resources page of the website.

Protective measures may occur by the university when an allegation of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking are made. These measures include changes to academic, residential,

transportation or working situation. These protective measures happen regardless of whether or not a report is made to local law enforcement.

The person accused of an act of sexual misconduct (respondent) will be contacted by the Title IX Coordinator. Both the complainant and respondent will receive an advocate to help them through the process if they would like, a list of resources, and a statement of rights. Missing Students

Oglethorpe Campus Safety, 404-504-1998, upon report of a residential student who is believed to be missing, will immediately notify the Dean of Students, Director of Residence Life and professional staff member on-call. If the report is made the Residence Life staff or Campus Life staff, they will immediately involve Campus Safety. Protocol is designed to minimize delay or confusion and to conduct an immediate investigation. Procedures include inspection of the student's residence assignment and interviews with roommates, suitemates, work study supervisors, coaches, and professors. Immediate follow up on information received via the inspection and interviews will ensue until the student is located. Relatives and/or family members will be updated according to FERPA guidelines and local authorities will be involved as soon as the need is determined.
